*Pastor Sadowy's Message
for
July & August 2023*

As a Christian, what does it really mean to celebrate our independence? We absolutely blessed, privileged even, to live in a country with so much liberty, freedom, and access to a vast array of resources. That is something to cherish and never to take for granted. But as our country celebrates all things independence, where is God in that? And how is our discipleship affected by celebrations of independence?

When I think about the theme of independence in scripture, of course Jesus himself comes to mind. He acted independently of the state and the government, especially when he made claims to have authority, to be the Son of Man, or to be associated with God. These were considered rule-breaking statements that he did independently of the law of the land. I am also reminded of Peter who is always so quick to speak up and independently inquire as to what Jesus is doing or meaning. This typically led to more insights and more teaching from Jesus, albeit in the form of hard lesson to learn for Peter. Then of course there is Judas, whose actions were so independent they were rogue. And, well, that did not end well for him or anyone.

In contrast, all the people who knew they needed Jesus come to mind. The woman who had been bleeding for 12 years thought, "If only I touch his cloak, I will be made well" (Matthew 9:21). The leader of the synagogue pleads with Jesus to heal his daughter when he said, "My daughter has just died; but come and lay your hand on her, and she will live" (Matthew 9:18). There is also the numerous examples of Jesus needing us to go out and spread his good news, from Mary on Easter morning to the call of each of the disciples to the charge for us to go and make believers.

Discipleship then calls us into a life of interdependence – recognizing that at any and all times we are inexplicably linked and connected to God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit as well as to each other. We cannot do this life of faith on our own; it cannot be done independently. Consider our Lutheran theology around communion. The distribution of communion – the sharing that is dependent on the giving and receiving between two people – is just as vital to communion as the elements themselves, the body and blood of Jesus. Or consider how we pray for each other, support those in our community through donations and acts of service, receive support from our neighbors. Discipleship and our society's understanding of independence are not particularly good friends.

The impacts of our culture's value of independence has shaped our society to believe everything can be done independently, even our relationship with God. I meet folks in the community all the time who tell me they do not need to go to church. They have their own faith. They worship God on their own time, in their own ways, and in places they determine to be sacred. They are assured of their salvation. To them, their faith is *independent*. "What more do I need?" they ask me.

I compassionately remind them of Jesus' countless invitations to community, that his best work was done in the company of his friends, and his ministry was largely to people who longed for relationship with others. Faith and discipleship are not *independent* activities; they were meant to be experienced in community with others in worship, prayer, and service at very least. Faith is nourished and cultivated when shared with others. And discipleship, after all, is following Jesus with the express purpose to serve others. Both are dependent on being reliant with others.

So yes, we can absolutely celebrate the myriad privileges we have as citizens of such a wealthy, resourced, and powerful nation. May we be so humble as to not take this for granted and use this time to realize our responsibility in utilizing our resources to love our global neighbors. And, as disciples of Christ, we are invited to recognize we are never truly independent in this life. Thanks be to God that we are undoubtedly knit together by the abundant love of Christian community.

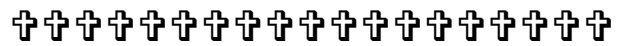
